

Ernest Kurtz, Ph.D.

For close to two decades, Ernie Kurtz has mentored my research and writing on the history of addiction treatment and recovery in America. Following completion of his Ph.D. in the history of American Civilization at Harvard in 1978, Ernie published his doctoral dissertation a year later as the book, *Not-God: A history of Alcoholics Anonymous* (Hazelden (2nd printing, 1980; 3rd, 1981; paperback, 1982; revised and expanded edition, 1991). His subsequent books have included:

- *The collected Ernie Kurtz*. Wheeling, WV: Bishop of Books, 1999.
